Licensing Act 2003 – Application for a new Premises Licence at: Morrisons (M Local), 57 Chapel Road, Worthing, BN11 1HW

Report by the Executive Head of Housing, Health & Community Safety

1. Recommendation

1.1 That a Sub Committee of Licensing & Control Committee "B" consider and determine the application made on behalf of :

WM Morrison Supermarkets Plc.

for a new Premises Licence to authorise the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premise.

2. Reasons for Hearing

2.1 The application has been the subject of formal representation by members of the public and it therefore falls to this sub-committee to determine.

3. Background

- 3.1 This store is situated on the corner of Stoke Abbott Road and Chapel Road. It is currently closed & vacant but until recently traded for many years as a video, DVD and computer games rental store in the name of 'Blockbuster Video'.
- 3.2 Blockbuster briefly held a premises licence at the store authorising the sale of alcohol, for consumption off the premises, but surrendered the licence in June 2007. Blockbuster ceased trading at this site earlier this year.
- 3.3 The store has now been empty for some months but an application was made on behalf of WM Morrison Supermarkets Plc. to Worthing Borough Council on the 15 May 2013 for a new Premises Licence for a proposed new 'local supermarket' to be situated on the site.
- 3.4 A plan of the area is attached (**Appendix A**)
- 3.4 A plan of the proposed premises is attached. (**Appendix B**)
- 3.5 The application is for authorisation for the sale of alcohol, for consumption off the premises. (**Appendix C**)

- 3.6 Copies of the letters and petitions received from members of the public. (Appendices D1-15)
- 3.7 A copy of WM Morrison Supermarkets Plc's operating manual entitled 'Overview of Operations for "M Local" Stores' (**Appendix E**)

4. The Application

- 4.1 The Application is attached at **Appendix C**. However, in summary, **WM Morrison** is applying for:
 - i) Authorisation for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises between the hours of:
 - 07.00hrs and 23.00hrs Monday to Sunday incl.
 - ii) The proposed opening hours of the premises to be: 07.00hrs and 23.00hrs Monday to Sunday incl.
- 4.2 As recommended by the Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 the applicant has completed an operating schedule as to how it is intended to address the Licensing Objectives if this application were granted.
- 4.3 The proposed designated supervisor detailed in the application is Nakesha Murrain who holds a personal licence issued by Leeds City Council.

5. Promotion of the Licensing Objectives

- 5.1 The Licensing Act 2003 and regulations require that the Council, as local licensing authority, carries out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder:
 - public safety;
 - the prevention of public nuisance;
 - the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 In carrying out its licensing functions, the licensing authority must also have regard to the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State and its own Statement of Licensing Policy. Members are advised that the following sections of the Worthing Borough Council's Policy may be particularly relevant to consideration of this matter, though of course the Policy in its entirety must be considered. Sections indicated relate to paragraph numbers in the Policy itself:
 - 4.1 The Council places huge importance on the prevention of crime and disorder. A high standard of control is, therefore, expected to be exercised over licensed premises.
 - 4.2 In accordance with Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 the Council

is under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect on, and the need to do all it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its areas. The possible crime and disorder implications are clearly relevant factors in the consideration of all applications and this is re-emphasised by the Licensing Act 2003 itself, the Guidance issued under section 182 to the Act and this policy. The Council will give "due regard" to all possible implications and its Licensing & Control Committee will always consider all the information available and relevant representations made, including those from interested parties and the responsible authorities, particularly the Police.

- 4.3 In their role as a responsible authority, Sussex Police are an essential source of advice and information on the impact and potential impact of licensable activities in the borough, particularly on the crime and disorder objective. The police have a key role in managing the night-time economy and usually have good working relationships with those operating in the local area. The council recognises that Sussex Police are the licensing authority's main source of advice on matters relating to the promotion of the crime and disorder, but may also be able to make relevant representations with regards to the other licensing objectives if they have evidence to support such representations. The Council will accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the police unless the authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. However, it remains incumbent on the police to ensure that their representations can withstand the scrutiny to which they would be subject at a hearing.
- 4.4 Licensed premises, especially those offering late entertainment, alcohol and refreshment for large numbers of people, can be a source of crime and disorder problems. The Council will expect Operating Schedules submitted with applications to satisfactorily address these issues, from the design of the premises through to the daily operation of the business, including, where appropriate, the policy and arrangements proposed in respect of the prevention of both alcohol and drug misuse.
- 4.5 Applicants will be expected to identify any particular issues (having regard to their particular type of premises and/or activities) which are likely to adversely affect the promotion of the crime and disorder objective in their particular case. Such steps as are required to deal with these identified issues should be included within the applicant's operating schedule.
- 4.6 Applicants are expected to seek advice, where necessary from Council Licensing Officers and Sussex Police, as well as taking into account, as appropriate, local planning and transport policies, and crime prevention strategies when preparing their plans and schedules.
- 4.7 In addition to the requirements for the Council to promote the licensing objectives, it also has a duty, as detailed in paragraph 4.2, under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in the Borough. The Council will consider attaching conditions to licences and permissions to deter and prevent crime and disorder within the vicinity if relevant representations are received. Whether or not incidents can be regarded as being in the vicinity of licensed premises is a question of fact and will depend on the particular circumstances of the case.
- 4.8 The Council recognises that the Licensing Act is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are

away from licensed premises. Nonetheless, it is a key aspect of such control and licensing law will always be part of a holistic approach to the management of the evening and night time economy in town centres.

6.16 The Council will generally consider the licensing of shops, stores and supermarkets to sell alcohol for consumption off the premises at any times they are open for shopping. However, it may consider there are very good reasons for restricting those hours, for example, where police or residents' representations are made in respect of isolated shops known to be the focus of disorder and disturbance.

6. Consultation

6.1 The application has been subject to the statutory consultation and statutory public advertisement arrangements in accordance with the provisions of the Act, in respect of which relevant representations were received from the following:

Other Persons – 2 X petitions containing a 58 & 312 signatures 13 X letters of representation

7. Relevant Representations

7.1 Details of the relevant representations received are reproduced at **Appendices D1** - **15.** They are considered to relate to the statutory licensing objectives as follows:

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

Public Safety

The Protection of Children from Harm

7.2 Those making relevant representation have been invited to attend the Sub-Committee.

8. Mediation

8.1 Due to the number of signatories to the petitions and the nature of the letters received mediation between the applicant and these individuals was deemed impractical.

9. Consideration

- 9.1 Members must take into consideration the following when determining this application:
 - The four statutory licensing objectives
 - Worthing Borough Council's Statement of Licensing Policy
 - Guidance issued by the Home Secretary
 - The relevant representation s from all parties.

- 9.2 These are the only matters to be addressed by the authority when considering this application. The statutory Licensing objectives are the only grounds on which representations can be made, and the only grounds on which an authority will be able to refuse an application or impose conditions in addition to statutory conditions and those proposed by the applicant in the Operating Schedule.
- 9.3 When considering this application for a premises licence the following options are available to the Sub-Committee:
 - a. Grant the licence, as requested,
 - b. Grant the licence, as requested, with additional conditions appropriate to the promotion of the specific licensing objectives on which relevant representations have been received.
 - c. Reject the whole or part of the application.

Members may also:

- d. Grant the licence but exclude certain licensable activities from the licence,
- e. Refuse to specify a particular person as a premises supervisor,
- f. Approve different parts of the premises for different activities.
- 9.4 Members are required to give reasons for their decision.

10. Legal Implications

- 10.1 Under Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Act, the following rights of appeal to the Magistrates' Court in respect of applications for a premises licence includes:
 - (1) The applicant may appeal against any decision to modify the conditions of the licence.
 - (2) The applicant may appeal against a rejection in whole or part of an application.
 - (3) A person who has made relevant representations may appeal against a licence being granted, or against the modification or lack of modification of any conditions.
- 10.2 Members are reminded that the Act allows for the local licensing authority to undertake a review following the grant of a premises licence, when requested to do so by a responsible authority, such as the police, or the fire authority, or any other person, such as a resident living in the vicinity of the premises. The Government's guidance states: "The proceedings set out in the 2003 Act for reviewing premises licences represent a key protection for the community where problems associated with crime and disorder, public safety, public nuisance or the protection of children from harm are occurring. It is the existence of these procedures which should, in general, allow licensing authorities to apply a light touch bureaucracy to the grant and variation of premises licences by providing a review mechanism when concerns relating to the licensing objectives arise later in respect of individual premises."

- 10.3 In determining this application, the principles of the Human Rights Act 1998 must be taken into consideration and the convention rights of both individuals and businesses will be given due weight.
- Members must consider each application on its own merits, and in accordance with the principles of natural justice, as well as the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. All relevant factors must be taken into account, and all irrelevant factors must be disregarded.
- 10.5 All applications, before Committee, must be considered against the backdrop of anti-discriminatory legislation, such as the Equality Act 2010 and also in accordance with the Council's stated policy on Equal Opportunities.
- 10.6 In accordance with Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 the Council is under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect on, and the need to do all it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its areas. The possible crime and disorder implications are clearly relevant factors in the consideration of all applications and this is re-emphasised by the Licensing Act 2003 itself. In giving "due regard" to these possible implications members will consider and weigh up all the information available and representations made, including those from interested parties and the responsible authorities particularly the Police.

11. Other Implications

11.1 Any decision taken will have regard for the local environment and, in particular, any conditions attached for the purposes of preventing public nuisance will take this principle into account.

12. Recommendation

12.1 Members are requested to determine the application for a new Premises Licence made on behalf of WM Morrison Supermarkets Plc for a proposed new supermarket to be situated at 57 Chapel Road, Worthing and give reasons for that determination.




Plan of Area





The Prevention Of Crime And Disorder

- The area given over to the display of alcohol will be no more than 15% of the sales area.
- All spirits to be behind the counter area.
- No display of alcohol within 2 metres of the entrance other than behind the counter.
- 4. No super strength beer, lager or cider of 5.5% abv or above shall be sold other than premium beer, lager or cider priced at £1.95 or above.
- 5. Digital CCTV and appropriate recording equipment to be installed in accordance with Home Office Guidelines relating to UK Police Requirements for Digital CCTV System, operated and maintained throughout the premises to cover all public areas, including the entrance to the premises. The CCTV cameras and recording equipment must be of sufficient quality to work in normal lighting levels inside the premises at all times. CCTV footage will be stored for a minimum of 28 days and the management will give full and immediate cooperation and technical assistance to the Police in the event that CCTV footage is required for the prevention and detection of suspected or alleged crime. The CCTV images will record and display dates and times, and these times will be checked regularly to ensure their accuracy. The management of the premises will ensure that key staff are fully trained in the operation of the CCTV, and will be able to download selected footage onto a disk for the police without difficulty or delay and without charge to Sussex Police. Any breakdown or system failure will be remedied as soon as practicable.
- There will be a personal licence holder on the premises at all times except in exceptional circumstances (e.g. siekness) and five personal licence holders in total will be assigned to the store.

The Protection Of Children From Harm

- All staff to be specifically trained in proxy sales and signage to deter proxy sales will be displayed.
- Notices to be displayed in store stating that it is an offence for under 18's to purchase alcohol.

- A proof of age scheme, such as Challenge 25, shall be operated at the premises
 where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic
 identification cards such as driving licence, passport or proof of age cards bearing
 the PASS mark hologram.
- Suitable signage advertising the proof of age scheme will be displayed in prominent locations in the premises.
- All staff members engaged, or to be engaged, in selling alcohol on the premises shall have received the following training in age-restricted sales:
 - The premises licence holder will ensure that all staff members engaged in selling
 alcohol on the premises shall receive induction training as to the lawful selling of
 age restricted products prior to the selling of such products, and verbal
 reinforcement/refresher training thereafter at intervals not more than six months,
 with the date and time of the verbal reinforcement/refresher training documented.
 - All age-restricted sales training undertaken by staff members shall be fully documented and recorded. All training records shall be made available to Sussex Police, Council Officers and West Sussex Trading Standards Service upon request.
- 6. The premises shall at all times maintain and operate an age-restricted sales refusals recording system (either in book or electronic form) which shall be reviewed by the Designated Premises Supervisor at intervals not to exceed 4 weeks and feedback given to staff as relevant. The refusals recording system to be signed and dated by the Designated Premises Supervisor at the time of each review. This refusals recording system shall be available upon request to police staff, Local Authority staff and West Sussex Trading Standards Service.



The premises of 57 Chapel road I do NOT want alcohol to be sold here. I have got my family to think about and I would not like the neighbourhood to go tit's up I have seen this many places where new shops selling alcohol have opened and caused to much trouble for the community near-by.

I worry for the safety of others and the anti-social behaviour that comes with to many shops selling alcohol around one area.

I know of a few friends and family members that would not like this shop to sell alcohol.

An application for a New Premises Licence for a new Morrisons (M Local) convenience store. The proposed store is to be situated at 57 Chapel Road, Worthing, BN11 1HW. The application is seeking authorisation for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises:

- Sale of Alcohol 07.00hrs to 23.00hrs Monday to Sunday incl.
- Opening to the public 07.00hrs to 23.00hrs Monday to Sunday incl.

This new store is proposed for the old 'Blockbuster' site which historically held such a premises licence but was surrendered in 2007.

Applicant: WM Morrison Supermarkets PLC.

I am writing to make a representation regarding the pending issue of a licence to sell alcohol at these premises.

Stoke Abbott Road.

Worthing, BN11 1HJ

My interest in this matter is because I am resident in a flat situated directly above these premises.

My concern about this licence is that it may cause crime, public nuisance and noise disturbance. I am basing my concerns upon observations of Tesco Express on Chapel Road a short distance away.

Tesco express, 23-25 Chapel Road experiences problems with shoplifters stealing alcohol in the late evening. The solution at Tesco express is to switch the automatic doors to manual to discourage shoplifters in the late evening.

The proposed Morrisons M shop will be a similar model to the Tesco Express shop and there is no reason to suppose that their problems will be any different from that of Tesco.express.

I should therefore like to ascertain what measures Morrissions will take to prevent the crime and disorder that is currently experienced at Tesco's (whether or not they report these matters to the police – remembering it is not in their interest to report such matters as repeated problems may lead to their licence being revoked).

I note that Tesco do not use a security guard as a deterrent to would be shop lifters of

alcohol. It is left to shop staff to prevent thefts. In my view a security guard should be in place to act as a deterrent to shop lifters in the evening particularly relating to alcohol theft.

A large screen TV linked to CCTV monitor at the entrance showing customers can help to act as a deterrent.

I also think that there should be provision to isolate the alcohol aisle so that if problems are recurring the aisle can be closed at certain times or days to prevent crime, disorder and nuisance.

I am not against this store selling alcohol but I do believe that measures should be put in place to ensure that the sale of alcohol is not detrimental to resident neighbours or the neighbourhood in general. I note Morrisons have not made any contact with neighbours to notify or ascertain their views or concerns.

If granted I should like a review of the alcohol licence after six months to enable resident neighbours and other interested parties to express opinions or concerns and give examples of problems that may arise.

It should be noted that many children live in Stoke Abbott Court and there welfare should also be taken into consideration.

It should be noted that Morrisions have not operated these small convenience shops before and the experience will also be a learning curve for them and I hope my views are expressed in relation to their interests as well

OVERVIEW OF OPERATIONS FOR "M LOCAL" STORES

INTRODUCTION

- This document is intended to provide Licensing Authorities with a broad overview of the key procedures and policies which WM Morrison Supermarkets PLC (Morrisons) has developed over many years with particular emphasis on the promotion of the four licensing objectives under the Licensing Act 2003.
- Morrisons currently operates over 480 stores throughout the United Kingdom. The stores provide a wide range of produce, groceries, household goods, electronics and clothing, catering to a wide target market.
- 3. Every store is licensed for the retail sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises and the company deals with an estimated 11 million customer transactions per week. The company has always prioritised the need to conduct its business in a responsible manner and in full compliance with regulatory provisions governing the sale of alcohol. The company has never been prosecuted under the Licensing Act 2003.
- With its long history in the retail business, and in consultation with experts, the company has developed a broad range of procedures and

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policies to fully comply with its duties across a wide range of regulatory fields from health and fire safety, to food safety and trading standards. These procedures have been recognised by independent trade and regulatory bodies so that Morrisons has been the recipient of numerous awards including (in Scotland) the "Safer Retailer of the Year" (2011) following an audit of policies and procedures and training in relation to age restricted products. The audits were carried out by the Scottish Business Crime Centre and Trading Standards Institute and Morrisons was the first national retailer to be awarded the title for all stores in Scotland. Other awards have included the "Wines and Spirits Educational Trust Educator Of The Year" and "National Training Awards" for the company's apprentice programme. A small selection of the company's awards are to be found in Appendix 1.

- 5. Morrisons has always worked closely with the statutory authorities and is willing to adopt recommendations where appropriate. The result, in the licensing field, is that our operating procedures address each of the licensing objectives under the Licensing Act 2003 and comply closely with other regulatory requirements.
- 6. The company has a Primary Authority Agreement with West Yorkshire Trading Standards. The Primary Authority audits and approves the company's policies and procedures and the company maintains close and regular contact with officers of the Council. The company's age verification policies and procedures have been endorsed by the primary authority.

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7. The procedures which the company has put in place are subject to

constant review and improvement and are the result of careful

consideration by the company's team of directors, managers and

professional advisors. All of these policies and procedures can be

made available to an officer of the responsible authorities upon

request.

"M LOCAL" STORES

8. In seeking to meet a growing demand for local convenience stores

which provide a high quality and consistent product range, Morrisons

has embarked upon the development of an estate of smaller stores in

appropriate localities. These stores, known as "M Local" are run to

the same high standards as the larger supermarket estate and benefit

from the same broad operating procedures outlined above. The

following provides a more detailed account of the procedures adopted

for "M Local" stores which are designed to meet the statutory

licensing objectives.

MANAGEMENT

(Addressing all four licensing objectives)

9. Each of the company's "M Local" stores is managed by a minimum of

5 managers. Each "M Local" will be operated by a store manager, an

STAFF TRAINING

(Addressing all four licensing objectives)

11.At store level, all staff are trained by store managers in a range of

areas including their responsibilities and obligations under the

Licensing Act 2003, relevant Health and Safety and Food Safety

legislation together with Morrisons own policies and procedures.

12.All staff are required to undertake their training (and in particular in

relation to licensing requirements) before they are allowed to work on

the tills. This training, including the requirement to implement the

company's "challenge 25" policy (see below) is regularly refreshed.

13. The quality of the company's training programme has been

recognised by numerous national bodies and Morrisons has won

several awards in this respect (see para 4 above)

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PRODUCT RANGE - ALCOHOL

14. Responsible retailing is a cornerstone of Morrisons ethos. This is

reflected as much in the care which is taken in the training of staff as

15. The limited range of alcoholic products available in an "M Local" is a

premium range targeted at the convenience market.

16. The provision of alcoholic products is only a relatively small part of

SECURITY

17. Morrisons' "M Local" Stores operate successfully without the need

for additional security personnel beyond that already provided by

trained management and staff.

18. The company will always risk assess particular localities and liaise

with police and other relevant authorities as to the need for any special

security measures.

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CCTV

19.CCTV is provided throughout Morrisons' premises at all times when the premises are trading and all images are recorded and stored on site for a minimum of 31 days and made available to responsible authorities on request.

CHILDREN

(Addressing the protection of children from harm)

20. As a national operator of supermarkets catering for families Morrisons has a great deal of experience in creating shopping environments which is suitable for children. Similarly, when considering the needs of younger customers, special attention is paid to the selection of products for sale and the manner in which they are sold.

21.Staff are all fully trained in the law relating to the sale of age related products and this training is refreshed at regular intervals. The Company operates a "challenge 25" policy and staff are required to insist on approved documentary identification whenever the customer appears to them to be under 25 years of age.

22. The till system has been designed to prompt cashiers when processing a sale of alcohol. Any refusal to sell, and the reason for the refusal, is recorded on the till system and retained in computer records. These records may be inspected by the responsible authorities upon request.

unannounced independent test purchases at stores using a nationally

recognised specialist company.

COMPLIANCE WITH SAFETY ISSUES AND LIAISON WITH

24. As set out at paragraph 4 and 5 above, Morrisons has developed a

wide range of procedures and risk assessments to address its duties

under statutory provisions aimed at ensuring the safety of the public

25. The company continues to reassess its policies in this regard and
