## Licensing Act 2003 – Application for a new Premises Licence for: Worthing Kebab & Burger Van Downland Business Park, Lyons Way, Worthing

#### Report by the Executive Head of Housing, Health & Community Safety

#### 1. Recommendation

1.1 That a Sub-Committee of Licensing & Control Committee "B" consider and determine an application made by :

#### Seyma Tekinerdogan & Memet Tekinerdogan

for a new Premises Licence to authorise the sale of late night refreshment from a mobile catering van that it is proposed to locate in Lyons Way.

#### 2. Reasons for Hearing

2.1 The application has been the subject of formal representation by a Responsible Authority and members of the public and it therefore falls to members to determine.

#### 3. Background

- 2.1 Lyons Way is situated in a commercial district known as the 'Downland Business Park'. This is a large industrial-retail park on the north-east outskirts of the borough. It contains a number of large commercial units with parking facilities operated by, among others, B & Q, Halfords and Sainsbury's. Also within the park is a petrol station opening 06.30hrs to 23.00hrs each day and Worthing United FC has its home ground there. Lyons Way runs through the business park up to the gates of 'Tenant's Hill Farm' but from this point is no public through road. Lyons Way is effectively a 'dead-end'. To the north of the park is farm land and the nearest residential properties are to the south situated the other side of the A23 and in Upper Brighton Road approx 130 meters away. The nearest premise licensed for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premise is 'The Downlands' public house situated to the west approx. 200 meters away.
- 3.2 Street trading is controlled under provisions of the Local Government (Misc. Prov.) Act 1982. Worthing Borough Council has adopted powers under the act to regulate street trading. However, the council has not put these controls in place on its

- industrial estates. Consequently, no permit is required to trade in the street in the vicinity of Lyons Way.
- 3.3 Currently there is a catering van that operates in the day from this site selling hot food in the form of bacon sandwiches, burgers etc. Officers are not aware of any complaints regarding the current trader. The applicants are not proposing to compete directly with the current trader but to trade later in the day.
- 3.4 Miss Tekinerdogan and Mr Tekinerdogan can site their mobile catering van in Lyons Way without a permit or licence and sell hot food legally between 05.00hrs and 23.00hrs each day. A premises licence is only being sought to allow this business to continue to trade later, into the following morning, on a Friday & Saturday nights.
- 3.5 Selling hot food & drink between 23.00hrs and 05.00hrs is a licensable activity requiring the authority of a premises licence. In the case of a mobile unit conducting such activity the premises licence relates to the piece of land on which the licence holder is proposing to trade from.
- 3.6 An application was made by Miss Tekinerdogan and Mr Tekinerdogan to Worthing Borough Council on the 28 May for a new Premises Licence for a mobile catering van to be situated in Lyons Way.
- 3.7 Failure to publish the advertisement relating to this application in the legal section of a local newspaper in the prescribed timescale extended the consultation period and delayed this application being processed. The required advertisement was properly published on 5 July 2013.
- 3.8 A plan of the area is attached (Appendix A)
- 3.9 A photograph of the proposed catering van is attached. (Appendix B)
- 3.10 The application is for authorisation for the sale of late night refreshment for consumption off the premises. (Appendix C)
- 3.11 Copies of the letters of representation received from members of the public. (Appendix D1-10)
- 3.12 A copy of the relevant representation received from the responsible authority, Sussex Police. (Appendix E)
- 3.13 A copy of the applicant's acceptance of all the conditions suggested by Sussex Police. (AppendixF)

#### 4. The Application

4.1 The Application is attached at **Appendix C**. However, in summary, Miss Tekinerdogan and Mr Tekinerdogan are applying for:

- i) Authorisation for the sale of late night refreshment for consumption off the premises between the hours of:
  - 23.00hrs and 02.00hrs, of the following morning Friday & Saturday
- ii) The proposed opening hours of the business to be:

17.00hrs to 23.00hrs Sunday to Thursday

17.00hrs to 02.00hrs, of the following morning, Friday & Saturday.

- 4.2 As recommended by the Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 the applicants have completed an operating schedule as to how they intend to address the Licensing Objectives if this application were granted.
- 5. Promotion of the Licensing Objectives
- 5.1 The Licensing Act 2003 and regulations require that the Council, as local licensing authority, carries out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives:
  - the prevention of crime and disorder;
  - public safety;
  - the prevention of public nuisance;
  - the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 In carrying out its licensing functions, the licensing authority must also have regard to the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State and its own Statement of Licensing Policy. Members are advised that the following sections of the Worthing Borough Council's Policy may be particularly relevant to consideration of this matter, though of course the Policy in its entirety must be considered. Sections indicated relate to paragraph numbers in the Policy itself:

#### Prevention of Crime & Disorder

- 4.2 The Council places huge importance on the prevention of crime and disorder. A high standard of control is, therefore, expected to be exercised over all licensed premises.
- 4.3 In accordance with Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 the Council is under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect on, and the need to do all it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its areas. The possible crime and disorder implications are clearly relevant factors in the consideration of all applications and this is re-emphasised by the Licensing Act 2003 itself, the Guidance issued under section 182 to the Act and this policy. The Council will give "due regard" to all possible implications and its Licensing & Control Committee will always consider all the information available and relevant representations made, including those from interested parties and the responsible authorities, particularly the Police.
- 4.4 In their role as a responsible authority, Sussex Police are an essential source of advice and information on the impact and potential impact of licensable activities in the borough, particularly on the crime and disorder objective. The police have a key role in managing the night-time economy and usually have good working

relationships with those operating in the local area. The council recognises that Sussex Police are the licensing authority's main source of advice on matters relating to the promotion of the crime and disorder, but may also be able to make relevant representations with regards to the other licensing objectives if they have evidence to support such representations. The Council will accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the police unless the authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. However, it remains incumbent on the police to ensure that their representations can withstand the scrutiny to which they would be subject at a hearing.

- 4.5 Licensed premises, especially those offering late entertainment, alcohol and refreshment for large numbers of people, can be a source of crime and disorder problems. The Council will expect Operating Schedules submitted with applications to satisfactorily address these issues, from the design of the premises through to the daily operation of the business, including, where appropriate, the policy and arrangements proposed in respect of the prevention of both alcohol and drug misuse.
- 4.6 Applicants will be expected to identify any particular issues (having regard to their particular type of premises and/or activities) which are likely to adversely affect the promotion of the crime and disorder objective in their particular case. Such steps as are required to deal with these identified issues should be included within the applicant's operating schedule.
- 4.8 In addition to the requirements for the Council to promote the licensing objectives, it also has a duty, as detailed in paragraph 4.2, under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in the Borough. The Council will consider attaching conditions to licences and permissions to deter and prevent crime and disorder within the vicinity if relevant representations are received. Whether or not incidents can be regarded as being in the vicinity of licensed premises is a question of fact and will depend on the particular circumstances of the case.
- 4.9 The Council recognises that the Licensing Act is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are away from licensed premises. Nonetheless, it is a key aspect of such control and licensing law will always be part of a holistic approach to the management of the evening and night time economy in town centres.

#### Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 4.17 Licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a range of disturbances impacting upon people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises or wider afield.
- 4.18 Noise disturbance can arise from entertainment or activities held within licensed premises and also from people or motor vehicles outside licensed premises. The Council will expect Operating Schedules to address these issues. Advice and guidance can be obtained from Licensing Officers or the Council's Environmental Protection Team. If representations are received the Council may utilise appropriate conditions to control noise disturbance and the use of such conditions will depend upon the activities/entertainment/hours of operation proposed; the nature of the locality; and existing background noise levels and ambient noise levels. Noise

- control conditions may include the satisfactory sound insulation of licensed premises; compliance with maximum noise levels; and limiting hours of operation.
- 4.19 When addressing public nuisance the applicant should initially identify any particular issues (having regard to their particular type/construction of their premises, proposed activities and nature of locality) which are likely to adversely affect the promotion of the objective to prevent public nuisance. Such steps as are required to deal with these identified issues should be included within the applicant's Operating Schedule.
- 4.20 Anti-social behaviour such as excessive noise from access and egress or patrons littering should also be addressed in the Operating Schedule.
- 4.21 Other matters that may give rise to nuisance are cooking odours, light pollution, waste collection and early morning/late night deliveries. The minimisation or prevention of such nuisance should also be addressed in the Operating Schedule if appropriate.

#### Late Night Refreshment - Cafes & Takeaways

- 7.13 Fast food premises which are open after 23.00hrs can attract large groups of customers, many of whom have been consuming alcohol in pubs, bars, or night clubs sometimes some distance away. The congregation of people around these premises leads to additional noise and disturbance and further congestion in the area. Although premises which serve cold food and drink are not subject to licensing and may stay open all night, they are not so attractive to people who have been drinking as those providing hot food and drink. The council considers that the addition of hot fast food and hot drink adds to the attractiveness of premises to people who have been drinking and who are consequently more likely to be involved in anti-social behaviour.
- 7.14 Sussex Police have in the past raised concerns about the levels of crime & disorder that can occur outside fast food premises late at night due to alcohol fuelled behaviour, and the opportunities for crime afforded by the congregation of people. Fast food premises have a comparatively high association with reports of crimes of violence against the person. The consumption of food outside premises can result in food waste and litter on pavements, to an extent that amounts to a public nuisance.
- 7.15 In addition, where there are fast food premises in the vicinity of public houses and nightclubs the rapid dispersal of people leaving these venues is significantly hindered. This delay in dispersal causes the potential for the licensing objectives to be compromised.
- 7.16 Where the police or others make representations against the grant or variation of a licence for late night refreshment regarding a premise in the vicinity of alcohol licensed premises because of serious concerns over dispersal problems the council will want to be assured that the Operating Schedule of the premise, and their overall management, training and levels of staffing, are appropriate to ensure that the licensing objectives are promoted in what may be challenging circumstances. Applications for extended hours may be refused in such circumstances where relevant representations on problems of late night disorder in an area are expressed. Alternatively the licence may be conditioned to include measures to address any concerns. Such as the provision of SIA door supervisors for example.

7.17 Each application will be considered on its merits, but the Council will generally refuse to grant licences to late night fast food vans/trailers that encourage persons to congregate and remain within the locality of licensed premises after they close due to the potential for the licensing objectives regarding the Prevention of Public Nuisance or of Crime & Disorder to be compromised.

#### 6. Consultation

6.1 The application has been subject to the statutory consultation and statutory public advertisement arrangements in accordance with the provisions of the Act, in respect of which relevant representations were received from the following:

Responsible Authorities – Sussex Police Other Persons – 10 letters of objection

#### 7. Relevant Representations

7.1 Details of the relevant representations received are reproduced at **Appendices D & E.** They are considered to relate to the statutory licensing objectives as follows:

#### Prevention of Crime & Disorder.

#### Prevention of Public Nuisance

7.2 Those making relevant representation have been invited to attend the Sub-Committee.

#### 8. Mediation

- 8.1 Sussex Police, in their representation, suggested the following conditions for the committee's consideration:
  - Induction training of staff must be completed, and fully documented regarding conflict management and issues that may arise due to operating during the night time economy.
  - All staff members employed at the premise must have emergency contact numbers for the Premises Licence Holder or delegated responsible person readily available while operating under the premises licence.
  - An incident register will be kept on the premises to record all incidents of crime or disorder. These records will be made available to the authorised members of the Local Licensing Authority and/or the Police upon request.
  - CCTV to be installed in accordance with Home Office Guidelines relating to UK Police Requirements for Digital CCTV System. CCTV Images shall be retained for at least 28 days and except for mechanical breakdown beyond the control of the proprietor, shall be made available upon request to the police. Any breakdown or system failure will be notified to the police immediately & remedied as soon as practicable. It will be the

responsibility of the licence holder, or duty manager, to ensure that any request from the police for a recording to be made for evidential purposes, is carried out as soon as possible in compliance with data protection legislation.

- All beverages will be provided in containers constructed of paper, plastic etc. or toughened glass. Containers constructed of breakable glass shall not be used.
- As a result of mediation the applicants have volunteered all the above conditions to their operating schedule and these, together with those detailed in the application, will become enforceable conditions of licence if members are of a mind to grant a licence. As a result it is confirmed that Sussex Police have withdrawn their representation. (**Appendix F**)
- 8.3 Due to the number and nature of the letters of objection from members of the public mediation between the applicant and these individuals was deemed impractical.

#### 9. Consideration

- 9.1 Members must take into consideration the following when determining this application:
  - The four statutory licensing objectives
  - Worthing Borough Council's Statement of Licensing Policy
  - Guidance issued by the Home Secretary
  - The relevant representations.
  - Amendments made to the application as a result of mediation.
- 9.2 These are the only matters to be addressed by the authority when considering this application. The statutory Licensing objectives are the only grounds on which representations can be made, and the only grounds on which an authority will be able to refuse an application or impose conditions in addition to statutory conditions and those proposed by the applicant in the Operating Schedule.
- 9.3 When considering this application for a premises licence the following options are available to the Sub-Committee:
  - a. Grant the licence, as requested,
  - b. Grant the licence, as requested, with additional conditions appropriate to the promotion of the specific licensing objectives on which relevant representations have been received.
  - c. Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 9.4 Members are required to give reasons for their decision.

#### 10. Legal Implications

10.1 Under Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Act, the following rights of appeal to the Magistrates' Court in respect of applications for a premises licence includes:

- (1) The applicant may appeal against any decision to modify the conditions of the licence.
- (2) The applicant may appeal against a rejection in whole or part of an application.
- (3) A person who has made relevant representations may appeal against a licence being granted, or against the modification or lack of modification of any conditions.
- 10.2 Members are reminded that the Act allows for the local licensing authority to undertake a review following the grant of a premises licence, when requested to do so by a responsible authority, such as the police, or the fire authority, or any other person, such as a resident living in the vicinity of the premises. The Government's guidance states: "The proceedings set out in the 2003 Act for reviewing premises licences represent a key protection for the community where problems associated with crime and disorder, public safety, public nuisance or the protection of children from harm are occurring. It is the existence of these procedures which should, in general, allow licensing authorities to apply a light touch bureaucracy to the grant and variation of premises licences by providing a review mechanism when concerns relating to the licensing objectives arise later in respect of individual premises."
- 10.3 In determining this application, the principles of the Human Rights Act 1998 must be taken into consideration and the convention rights of both individuals and businesses will be given due weight.
- Members must consider each application on its own merits, and in accordance with the principles of natural justice, as well as the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. All relevant factors must be taken into account, and all irrelevant factors must be disregarded.
- 10.5 All applications, before Committee, must be considered against the backdrop of anti-discriminatory legislation, such as the Equality Act 2010 and also in accordance with the Council's stated policy on Equal Opportunities.
- 10.6 In accordance with Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 the Council is under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect on, and the need to do all it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its areas. The possible crime and disorder implications are clearly relevant factors in the consideration of all applications and this is re-emphasised by the Licensing Act 2003 itself. In giving "due regard" to these possible implications members will consider and weigh up all the information available and representations made, including those from interested parties and the responsible authorities particularly the Police.

#### 11. Other Implications

11.1 Any decision taken will have regard for the local environment and, in particular, any conditions attached for the purposes of preventing public nuisance will take this principle into account.

#### 12. Recommendation

12.1 Members are requested to determine the application for a new Premises
Licence made by Miss Seyma Tekinerdogan & Mr Memet Tekinerdogan for
their proposed new catering business called 'Worthing Kebab & Burger Van'
to allow late night refreshment from a site in Downland Business Park, Lyons
Way, Worthing and give reasons for that determination.







We had a photocopy of a notice dated 28<sup>th</sup> May 2013 put through our letter box today 28<sup>th</sup> July 2013 stating an application for THE SALE OF LATE NIGHT REFRESHMENTS at Lyons way Worthing, had been put forward to the licensing unit and a representation has to be with this unit by 31<sup>st</sup> July 2013. Nice to give us the same notice as the applicant TWO months for them THREE working days for us.

We are against the application due to the lateness the business wishes to open and the nights it wishes to operate. We have enough noise from cars and pedestrians leaving the Downland's pub and take away establishments at the parade of shops plus joy riders and skate boarders using the car parks as a racing track during the summer months. The food Van that is already there during the day gives off a smell that is unpleasant.

My next door neighbour and I have in the past had our cars damage on our driveways by drunk youths at this time of night and this application for the food van to be selling food between 23hrs and 02am will only increase the problems we have had to endure over many years, the police are unable to do anything as the car parks are private property.

The only people going to use this facility are persons leaving establishments such as late night pubs and night clubs which are located in the town centre, there are plenty of food takeaways in town we do not need this food van at Lyons way.

- The proposed opening times of 23.00 to 02.00 on Fridays and Saturdays are totally unsuitable for the area. This is a retail park and with the last premises being Sainsbury's closing at 11pm on Fridays and 10pm on Saturdays there will be no passing trade from these times. The proposed opening times are later than similar takeaway outlets in Worthing making it the only venue open to the whole area, therefore if this application is granted, and as there is no public transport option at this time of night, customers will be required to travel there by car causing an increase of vehicles in this area until the early mornings of Saturday and Sunday.
- Due to the potential of large increases of members of the public gathering in a single area late at night this will require a regular increased police presence impacting on the limited resources the police have already at these times.
- This application, if passed, will cause noise pollution and nuisance to the surrounding
  residential areas. Historically, local residents have had noise issues with cars and motor
  bikes using the approach roads and car parks of Sainsbury's and B and Q as race circuits.
  Having successfully negotiated with these outlets to lock the car parks, interest in the area

- As takeaway food outlets often have litter issues surrounding them, this will be no different at this location.









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

#### Application for Burger Van in Lyons Way, Worthing

As the owner of a business based in Downlands Business Park, I write to express our concern with regards to the licence application for a mobile Burger Van at Lyons Way.

For the avoidance of doubt, a burger van trading under the name of Oscars currently operates from the site but, as this is during the working day, we have no concerns with regards to this.

I understand that a licence application has been made for a mobile Burger Van to be operated in Lyons Way from 17:00 to 23:00 on Sundays through to Thursday and from 23:00 to 02:00 on Friday and Saturday evenings.

Our primary concerns centre around the prevention of public nuisance and also crime and disorder.

Lyons Way is a no through road that provides access to Downlands Business Park, Worthing United Football Club and delivery access to both B&Q and Sainsbury's. It also provides access to the farm which is situated at the end of the road. As none of the retailers operate 24 hours a day, any potential clientele of the Burger Van would have no other cause to travel to Lyons Way other than to purchase food from the van and, in all likelihood, would do so using motor transport. Given the vicinity of Worthing and Lancing town centres, the need for a Burger Van in a retail park, which has closed for the evening, is questionable. It is of particular concern given that the van will operate around the closing times for pubs and night clubs; up to 2.00am on a Friday and Saturday night. There is significant potential for public nuisance and disorder in the hours of darkness in what is otherwise a no through road.

Since moving to Downlands Business Park, six years ago, we have had cause to contact Worthing Borough Council with regards to unauthorised vehicles namely motor buses and caravans being parked outside our facility. This problem has been ongoing and despite much correspondence we have witnessed different caravans appearing time after time. Due to the nature of our business, we have staff that are on call 24 hours and are required to enter the premises in the middle of the night or late in the evening. The nuisance and concern caused by the presence of travellers camping illegally at the end of Lyons Way is only surpassed by the illicit and antisocial behaviour that is undertaken late into the night on



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certain occasions. Whilst I appreciate we simply do not have the law enforcement resources necessary to discourage such crime and disorder 24 hours a day, the provision of a late night Burger Van would only serve to encourage such behaviour.

If a licence is granted for a Burger Van to operate into the late evening and early morning, our concern is that it will only serve to increase the public nuisance and illegal activity in Lyons Way. I know from personal experience that the drive to work along Lyons Way in the early hours of the morning can be both intimidating and frightening when confronted by the sight of illegal encampments, rubbish, discarded cans of alcohol and drug paraphernalia. There would be a genuine cause for concern over the safety and wellbeing of my staff having to work late into the evening or early mornings given the potential for the Burger Van to attract and encourage yet further antisocial behaviour in the hours of darkness in what should be an otherwise quiet access road.

In the interests of preventing a public nuisance or encouraging the illegal activities which seem to plague the road already, I ask that these concerns be considered and that the application for a licence to operate a late night Burger Van in Lyons Way is not granted. #### 2003 Licensing Act Premises Licence Application - Late Night Refreshment Burger Van - Lyons Way, Worthing

I would like to make representation against the above Licence being granted on the grounds of the Prevention of Crime & Disorder, the Prevention of Public Nuisance, Public Safety and the Protection of Children from Harm.

I currently walk or drive past this site on a twice daily basis, usually early in the morning and in the evening, in order to gain access to Tenants Hill Farm, Lyon's Way.

In addition to 'courting couples' that regularly use this secluded area for whatever it is they get up to in their cars I have often witnessed 'deals' taking place, particularly in the evenings, between young people loitering in small groups in and around parked cars either outside the secluded farm gates or further down Lyons Way where this Burger Van proposes to be sited. Although I cannot prove my suspicions I strongly suspect these are drug deals and the litter left in the area suggests this to be the case.

In addition the area attracts lots of young persons in customised cars best described as 'boy racers' they hang around the area revving vehicles and racing. The provision of a catering van late into the evening will increase the attractiveness of this area only to such individuals leading to noise, increased litter, increased anti social driving and potentially crime & disorder.

This application is regarding late night refreshment after 11.00pm at night at weekends. This is a secluded and quiet area with nothing to attract the public at night in the vicinity and is hardly used currently except by those up to no good that use the area because of its remoteness, I feel the presence of this van would only encourage more such people to carry out their dubious business and activities.

When alone, I do not feel safe having to walk or drive past and witness what is going on and the cars present often speed past me upon exit from the area. I request the committee refuse this application as any licence holder will not be able to control what activities takes place in the vicinity of his van and his presence will encourage an increase in number of individuals engaging in antisocial behaviour and crime.
