Licensing Act 2003 - Application for a Variation to a Premises Licence

Londis - Churchills Newsagents 115 Montague Street, Worthing, BN11 3BP

Report by the Director for Communities

1. Recommendation

1.1 That a Sub Committee of Licensing & Control Committee "B" considers and determines the application made by:

Mr Sharuvinothan Yoganathan

for a Variation to Premises Licence LN/ which authorises the sale of Alcohol for consumption off the premises at the above store.

2. Reasons for Hearing

2.1 The application has been the subject of formal representation by two responsible authorities and one member of the public and it therefore falls to this sub-committee to determine.

3. Background

- 3.1 An application was made by Mr Yoganathan to the Licensing Authority, Worthing Borough Council, on 24 June 2022 for the grant of a variation to the premises licence.
- 3.2 The newsagents/convenience store is situated in Montague Street. The store occupies a ground floor retail unit next door to a hot food takeaway. Montague Street is the busy main pedestrianised commercial street in the town centre and contains a large variety of retail units, restaurants, cafes and takeaways some of which operate into the evening.

- 3.6 The current premises licence is attached at **Appendix C**. However, in summary, the current licence authorises:
 - Sale of Alcohol for consumption off the premises
 - o 07:00 hrs to 23:00 hrs Sunday Wednesday
 - o 07:00 hrs to 01:00 hrs (of the following morning) Thursday Saturday
 - Opening to the Public
 - o 07:00 hrs to 23:00 hrs Sunday Wednesday
 - o 07:00 hrs to 01:00 hrs (of the following morning) Thursday Saturday

4. The Application

- 4.1 The Application is attached at **Appendix D**. However, in summary, the application is seeking a variation to the licence to authorise:
 - Amendment & extension of the following hours for licensable activity to:
 - Alcohol Sales for consumption off the premises:
 - 00:00 hrs to 24:00 hrs Monday Sunday incl. (24hrs a day)
 - Opening to the Public:
 - 00:00 hrs to 24:00 hrs Monday Sunday incl. (24hrs a day)

No other changes were proposed by the application.

- 4.2 There is a comprehensive set of conditions on the licence. The licence holder considers these to have been successful in promoting all the licensing objectives and no application is made to amend or remove any of these current conditions. The applicant has offered two extra conditions and these can be found in the application's operating schedule in Appendix D.
- 5. **Promotion of the Licensing Objectives**
- 5.1 The Licensing Act 2003 and regulations require that the Council, as local licensing authority, carries out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder;
 - public safety;
 - the prevention of public nuisance;
 - the protection of children from harm.

5.2 In carrying out its licensing functions, the licensing authority must also have regard to the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State and its own Statement of Licensing Policy. Members are advised that the following sections of the Worthing Borough Council's Policy may be particularly relevant to consideration of this matter, though of course the Policy in its entirety must be considered. Sections indicated relate to paragraph numbers in the Policy itself:

Prevention of Crime & Disorder

- 4.8 The Council places huge importance on the prevention of crime and disorder. A high standard of control is, therefore, expected to be exercised over licensed premises.
- 4.10 In accordance with Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 the Council is under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect on, and the need to do all it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its areas. The possible crime and disorder implications are clearly relevant factors in the consideration of all applications and this is re-emphasised by the Licensing Act 2003 itself, the Guidance issued under section 182 to the Act and this policy. The Council will give "due regard" to all possible implications and its Licensing & Control Committee will always consider all the information available and relevant representations made, including those from interested parties and the responsible authorities, particularly the Police.
- 4.11 In their role as a responsible authority, Sussex Police are an essential source of advice and information on the impact and potential impact of licensable activities in the borough, particularly on the crime and disorder objective. The police have a key role in managing the night-time economy and usually have good working relationships with those operating in the local area. The council recognises that Sussex Police are the licensing authority's main source of advice on matters relating to the promotion of crime and disorder, but may also be able to make relevant representations with regards to the other licensing objectives if they have evidence to support such representations. The Council will accept all reasonable and proportionate representations made by the police unless the authority has evidence that to do so would not be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. However, it remains incumbent on the police to ensure that their representations can withstand the scrutiny to which they would be subject at a hearing.
- 4.16 The Licensing Authority recognises that the Licensing Act is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are away from licensed premises. Nonetheless, it is a key aspect of such control and licensing law will always be part of a holistic approach to the management of the evening and night time economy in town centres.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 4.24 Licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a range of disturbances impacting upon people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises or wider afield.
- 4.25 Noise disturbance can arise from entertainment or activities held within licensed premises and also from people or motor vehicles outside licensed premises. The Council will expect Operating Schedules to address these issues. Advice and guidance can be obtained from Licensing Officers or the Council's Environmental Protection Team. If representations are received the Council may utilise appropriate conditions to control noise disturbance and the use of such conditions will depend upon the activities/entertainment/hours of operation proposed; the nature of the locality; and existing background noise levels and ambient

- noise levels. Noise control conditions may include the satisfactory sound insulation of licensed premises; compliance with maximum noise levels; and limiting hours of operation.
- 4.26 When addressing public nuisance the applicant should initially identify any particular issues (having regard to their particular type/construction of their premises, proposed activities and nature of locality) which are likely to adversely affect the promotion of the objective to prevent public nuisance. Such steps as are required to deal with these identified issues should be included within the applicant's Operating Schedule.
- 4.27 Anti-social behaviour such as excessive noise from access and egress or patrons littering should also be addressed in the Operating Schedule.

DEMAND, SATURATION & HOURS

6.4 Consideration will be given to imposing stricter conditions in respect of noise control where premises are situated in mainly residential areas. This will particularly apply in circumstances where, having regard to the location, size and nature of the licensed premises, it is likely that disturbance will be caused to residents in the vicinity of the premises, or its environs, by concentrations of people either present or leaving during normal night-time sleeping periods (23.00hrs to 07.00hrs).

SPECIFIC CONSIDERATIONS

Alcohol - On & Off Sales

- 7.1 It is now a mandatory condition that all licence holders selling alcohol put in place an age verification policy for the premises. In some circumstances the Licensing Authority will impose, where necessary to promote the Licensing Objectives, implicit conditions on the checking of the age of those who appear under 21 or 25 to ensure that alcohol is not sold to those under 18 years of age.
- 7.2 Licence holders need to have sufficient day to day control of operations at their premises. They will be held responsible for breaches of the licence and ensuring there is adequate staffing and training. The authorities will continue to use young people for the 'test purchasing' of alcohol and CCTV evidence, which has proved its usefulness in prosecutions for unlawful sales of alcohol. The likely consequences of a Review of licence for underage sales include the imposition of additional conditions such as the attendance of a personal licence holder, licence suspensions and in some cases revocation to act as deterrence.

Alcohol

Stores & Supermarkets – Off Sales

- 7.3 The Home Office Guidance to the Act recommends that shops, stores and supermarkets selling alcohol should generally be permitted to match the hours during which they may sell alcohol with their normal trading hours, unless there are exceptional reasons related to the Licensing Objectives, in particular 'the prevention of crime and disorder' and 'the prevention of public nuisance'.
- 7.4 The Licensing Authority will consider all applications on their own merit and will not consider 'need or demand' but If an area is experiencing problems and this is linked to the number of premises in the area already selling alcohol, for consumption off the premises, the Licensing Authority will carefully consider the cumulative impact on the Licensing Objectives of any new application if relevant representation is received.

- 7.5 The Licensing Authority will be particularly concerned with regard to the granting of new licences to stores and supermarkets in localities where the following problems have been identified:
 - Alcohol sales to persons who are drunk
 - Underage drinking
 - Street drinking
 - Pre-loading & post-loading
- 7.6 Selling alcohol to a person who is drunk or to a person who is under the age of 18 are both offences under the Licensing Act. The council recognises that the vast majority of licensees are very aware of their responsibilities and the duty of care they have selling alcohol to the public. However, the Licensing Authority takes both these issues extremely seriously.
- 7.7 The Licensing Authority considers it vital that licence holders provide formal and effective training to all staff involved in the sale of alcohol to recognise members of the public who are drunk or underage and give their staff the ability and confidence to refuse service. The Licensing Authority will expect operating schedules to demonstrate that the licence holder has considered such matters and addressed them as far as possible and that formal training records are kept on the premise and are to be made available for inspection by Police and/or Licensing Unit officers on request.
- 7.8 Over recent years problems associated with street drinking have been experienced across the borough but particularly in the town centre, on the promenade, the beach and Worthing's public parks & gardens. While there are some areas with recurring problems with regard to street drinking groups they also crop up in different areas at different times. These individuals and the shops that supply them can be a focus of antisocial behaviour, disorder and disturbance. The supply of alcohol to individuals involved in the day-long consumption of alcohol on the street and in open spaces can directly lead to these groups of drinkers causing various types of crime, public nuisance and anti-social behaviour.
- 7.9 Pre-loading and post-loading, the sale of alcohol to people who consume it on the way to or from venues licensed for the consumption of alcohol on the premises, gives rise to problems of drunkenness and disorderly behaviour. The proliferation of stores selling alcohol for consumption off the premises is of concern if it leads to drinking on the streets or alcohol being carried into premises such as pubs and nightclubs. The council is concerned that alcohol loading from off-licence sales is a significant problem in the town and adversely affects the Licensing Objectives.
- 7.10 Where Sussex Police or others make representations against the grant of a further licence for off sales, because of their serious concerns over any of the problems listed above and the disorder associated with the off sale of alcohol in the area, the Licensing Authority will give specific consideration to restricting the number, type, and the hours of premises selling alcohol exclusively for consumption off the premises. The Licensing Authority will want to be assured that the Operating Schedule of premises, and their overall management, training and levels of staffing, are appropriate to ensure that the licensing objectives are promoted in what may be challenging circumstances. The earliest and latest hours of opening will be of particular concern. This is because problematic street drinkers and others who are seriously addicted to alcohol, may be drawn to shops that sell alcohol earlier in the morning and later in the evening than other premises and consequently create public nuisance. Where there are representations on problems of disorder the hours when alcohol may be sold for

- consumption off the premises may be conditioned to be less than the generally granted hours issued to public houses and restaurants in the area.
- 7.11 Due to these concerns and their link to crime, disorder and disturbance, the Licensing Authority will not, as a general rule, grant applications for the 24-hour sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises. It will consider very seriously any representation made by Sussex Police, other responsible authorities, and relevant representations from the public before determining such applications.
- 7.12 To address the problems of street drinkers, underage drinkers and pre/postloaders the Council has introduced a controlled drinking zone across the whole borough giving the police powers to stop street drinking and seize alcohol and receptacles under the powers of the Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001. In addition short term Dispersal Zones have and will be used in parts of the town where the break up of street drinking groups is required to disrupt any emerging patterns of street drinking.
- 7.13 When requested by the Police, or other authorities, the Licensing Authority may impose on new applications, or on existing licences at review, conditions requiring:
 - No sales of alcoholic beverages (beers, lagers & ciders) over a specified limit of alcohol by volume or of specified quantities (e.g. of beers, lagers and ciders over 6.0% alcoholic content by volume).
 - No sales of single cans or bottles of beer, lager and cider in containers containing less than 500ml.
 - No sales of miniature bottles of wine or spirit in units of less than 35cl.
 - Other conditions may be imposed directed at reducing problematic street drinking.
 - Conditions stopping irresponsible drink promotions that do not follow best practice, that would appeal to underage drinkers or street drinkers or encourage excessive consumption.
 - Conditions relating to the positioning of alcohol within the shop and the types
 of displays of alcohol within the store. Particularly those displays that might
 appeal to younger consumers.

6. Consultation

- 6.1 The application has been subject to the statutory consultation and statutory public advertisement arrangements in accordance with the provisions of the Act, in respect of which relevant representations were received from the following:
 - Responsible Authorities 2 X Representations
 - o A&W Environmental Protection Team
 - Sussex Police
 - Other Persons
 - 1 letter of representation received from Worthing Pubwatch.

7. Relevant Representations

- 7.1 Detail of the relevant representations received are reproduced at **Appendix E & F**. They are considered to relate to the statutory licensing objectives as follows:
 - Prevention of Crime & Disorder
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 7.2 Sussex Police made a number of comments and listed a number of conditions that they consider are required to enable this premise to meet the licensing objectives if members were of a mind to grant the variation.
- 7.3 Adur & Worthing Councils' Environmental Protection Team made a number of comments regarding their concerns that granting the extended hours will negatively impact on the prevention of public nuisance objective.
- 7.3 One representation was received from Worthing Pubwatch which expressed concerns regarding possible crime & disorder, anti-social behaviour and public nuisance implications that can be associated with very late night alcohol sales.
- 7.4 The applicant, the responsible authorities and members of the public that made representation have been formally notified of this hearing and invited to attend.

8. Mediation

- 8.1 The Licensing Act 2003 encourages mediation.
- 8.2 No information regarding mediation between the applicant and the responsible authorities or Worthing Pubwatch has been provided to date. Members will be informed if there are any developments.

9. Consideration

- 9.1 Members must take into consideration the following when determining this application:
 - The four statutory licensing objectives
 - Worthing Borough Council's Statement of Licensing Policy
 - Guidance issued by the Home Secretary
 - The relevant representations from all parties and any mediated agreements reached.
- 9.2 These are the only matters to be addressed by the authority when considering this application. The statutory Licensing Objectives are the only grounds on which representations can be made, and the only grounds on which an authority will be able to refuse an application or impose conditions in addition to statutory conditions and those proposed by the applicant in the Operating Schedule.
- 9.3 When considering this application for a variation, pursuant to s 35 of the Act the following options available to the Sub-Committee:
 - A. To grant the variation, as requested,
 - B. To grant the variation as requested but with additional conditions appropriate to the promotion of the specific licensing objectives on which relevant representations have been received.
 - C. Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 9.4 Members are required to give reasons for their decision.

10. Legal Implications

- 10.1 Under Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Act, the following rights of appeal to the Magistrates' Court in respect of applications for a premises licence includes:
 - A. The applicant may appeal against any decision to modify the conditions of the licence.
 - B. The applicant may appeal against a rejection in whole or part of an application.
 - C. A person who has made relevant representations may appeal against a licence being granted, or against the modification or lack of modification of any conditions.
- 10.2 The Act allows for the local licensing authority to undertake a review following the grant of a premises licence, when requested to do so by a responsible authority, such as the police or the fire authority, or any other party, such as a resident living in the vicinity of the premises. The government's guidance states:

"The proceedings set out in the 2003 Act for reviewing premises licences represent a key protection for the community where problems associated with licensing objectives are occurring after the grant or variation of a premises licence.

At any stage, following the grant of a premises licence, a responsible authority, or any other person, may ask the licensing authority to review the licence because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.

- 10.3 In determining this application, the principles of the Human Rights Act 1998 must be taken into consideration and the convention rights of both individuals and businesses will be given due weight.
- Members must consider each application on its own merits, and in accordance with the principles of natural justice, as well as the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. All relevant factors must be taken into account, and all irrelevant factors must be disregarded.
- 10.5 All applications, before the Committee, must be considered against the backdrop of anti-discriminatory legislation, such as the Equality Act 2010 and also in accordance with the Council's stated policy on Equal Opportunities.
- 10.6 In accordance with Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 the Council is under a duty to exercise its functions with due regard to the likely effect on, and the need to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its areas. The possible crime and disorder implications are clearly relevant factors in the consideration of all applications and this is re-emphasised by the Licensing Act 2003 itself. In giving "due regard" to these possible implications members will consider and weigh up all the information available and representations made, including those from interested parties and the responsible authorities particularly the Police.

11. Other Implications

11.1 Any decision taken will have regard for the local environment and, in particular, any conditions attached for the purposes of preventing public nuisance will take this principle into account. There are no significant direct race relations or equal opportunity implications that have been identified.

12. Recommendation

12.1 Members are requested to determine the application for a Variation to the Premises Licence at the 'Londis - Churchills Newsagents' store situated at 115 Montague Street, Worthing made by Mr Sharuvinothan Yoganathan and give reasons for that determination.





Annexe 1: Mandatory Conditions

A. Mandatory conditions: Supply of Alcohol

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:-
 - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

B. Mandatory conditions: Door Supervision

When employed each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

C. Mandatory conditions: Age Verification

An age verification policy for the premises must be produced, implemented and details made available to authorised officers upon request. The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:

- a holographic mark, or
- an ultraviolet feature.

D. Mandatory conditions: Permitted Price

A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

For the purposes of the condition "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979; "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula—

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

- I. P is the permitted price
- II. D is the rate of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
 - V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

"relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence —

- I. the holder of the premises licence
- II. the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- III. the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

Full details regarding this condition can be found in the Home office Guidance on banning the sale of alcohol below the cost of duty plus VAT for suppliers of alcohol and enforcement authorities in England & Wales dated May 2014.

E. Permitted Hours

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during the premise's permitted hours.

F. Alcohol Off Sales

Alcohol shall not be sold in an open container or be consumed on the licensed premises.

Annexe 2: Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- 1. CCTV to be installed at the premise in accordance with Home Office Guidelines relating to UK Police Requirements for Digital CCTV Systems. CCTV Images shall be retained for at least 28 days and except for mechanical breakdown beyond the control of the proprietor, shall be made available upon request to the police. Any breakdown or system failure will be notified to the police immediately & remedied as soon as practicable. It will be the responsibility of the DPS, or duty manager, to ensure that any request from the police for a recording to be made for evidential purposes, is carried out as soon as possible in compliance with data protection legislation.
- 2. Outside of the hours for the supply of alcohol and when the premises is still open to the public, alcohol on display in the public area will be concealed from public view by means of lockable shutters or secure blinds.
- 3. Alcohol will not be placed in the public area of the shop within 2 metres of the public entrance. Spirits will be stored and displayed behind the servery only.
- 4. The premise shall at all times maintain and operate a sales refusals book and an incident log which shall be reviewed by the Designated Premises Supervisor at intervals of no less than four (4) weeks and feedback given to staff as relevant. Both the refusal register and the incident register will be kept on the premises to record all refusals and incidents of crime or disorder. These records will be made available to the Authorised members of the Local Licensing Authority and/or the Police upon request.
- 5. The premise will operate a "Challenge 25" policy whereby any person attempting to buy alcohol who appears to be under 25 will be asked for photographic ID to prove their age. The only form of ID that will be accepted are passports, driving licences with a photograph or Portman Group, Citizen card or validate proof of age cards bearing the "PASS" mark hologram. Suitable and sufficient signage advertising the "Challenge 25" policy will be displayed in prominent locations in the premises.
- 6. All staff members engaged, or to be engaged, in selling alcohol on the premise shall receive full training pertinent to the Licensing Act, specifically in regard age-restricted sales, and the refusal of sales to persons believed to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Induction training must be completed, and fully documented, prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member and refresher training thereafter at intervals of no less than four (4) months. All restricted sales training undertaken by staff members shall be fully documented and recorded. All training records shall be made available to the Sussex Police Local Authority Licensing officers and the local Trading Standards service upon request.
- 7. At all times the premise is open and undertaking licensable activity, members of staff must be able to communicate sufficiently to enable them to promote the 4 licensing

- objectives, specifically, the ability to make effective age and I.D. challenges and ensure alcohol is retailed responsibility.
- 8. No beer or cider to be sold from the shop that has an alcohol by volume (ABV) level of more than 6%.
- 9. No beer or cider cans to be sold in single units. Beer and cider is only to be sold in multiples of two (2) cans/bottles. However, if street drinking problems occur in the vicinity and the licence holder is formally requested by Sussex Police's Licensing Team, in writing, a minimum limit of four (4) cans/bottles will be implemented by the licence holder.

I refer to the above application and make the following comments on behalf of Public Health and Regulation at Worthing Borough Council concerning the prevention of Public Nuisance. This application seeks to extend the opening hours and extend the hours for alcohol off sales to 0700hrs – 0659hrs Monday to Sunday.

Whilst I acknowledge the premises are situated in an area which can at times be busy, there are residential dwellings in the locality. The background noise at this location during nighttime hours will be low despite its location, meaning any noise produced by customers congregating outside the premises is likely to be audible within nearby residential dwellings and therefore could result in a public nuisance. As far as I am aware there are no other premises in the locality open 24 hours a day and no details have been provided on the application specifying how the applicant intends to prevent public nuisance.

It is my opinion that if the application is granted as applied for, a public nuisance (as defined by the Licensing Act 2003, ("the Act") may be caused to residents within the vicinity. I am therefore unable to support this application.

I write on behalf of the Chief Officer of Police for Sussex to raise a representation against the grant of the above application on the grounds of the licensing objective(s) of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, the Prevention of Public Nuisance and the Protection of Children from Harm.

Sussex Police have no objection to the principal of the application, which is to increase the opening hours and increase the hours for alcohol off sales to 0700hrs – 0659hrs Monday to Sunday. It is considered that additional measures are necessary. Sussex Police propose the following additional and emended conditions which should not prove onerous on the day-to-day operation of the premises:

- Digital CCTV and appropriate recording equipment to be installed in accordance with Home Office Guidelines relating to UK Police Requirements for Digital CCTV System (PSDB Publication Number 09/05), operated and maintained throughout the premises internally and externally to cover all public areas, including the entrance to the premises. The system shall be on and recording at all times the premises licence is in operation.
 - The CCTV cameras and recording equipment must be of sufficient quality to work in all lighting levels inside the premises at all times.
 - o CCTV footage will be stored for a minimum of 31 days.
 - The management will give full and immediate cooperation and technical assistance to the Police in the event that CCTV footage is required for the prevention and detection of suspected or alleged crime.
 - The CCTV images will record and display dates and times, and these times will be checked regularly to ensure their accuracy.

Sussex Police, Neighbourhood Licensing Team

- Subject to GDPR guidance and legislation, the management of the premises will ensure that key staff are fully trained in the operation of the CCTV, and will be able to download selected footage onto a disk (or other electronic portable device acceptable to Sussex Police) for the police without difficulty or delay and without charge to Sussex Police.
- Any breakdown or system failure will be notified to the police immediately & remedied as soon as practicable.
- In the event of the CCTV system hard drive being seized as evidence as part of a criminal investigation by Sussex Police or for any other reason, the premises will be expected to install a replacement hard drive or a temporary replacement drive as soon as practicable.
- 2. Notices will be placed requesting customers to leave quietly, not drink on the streets and respect the neighbours.
- 3. All off sales of alcohol to be made in sealed containers for consumption away from the premises.

Conditions for alcohol Delivery Service.

4. Alcohol deliveries will only be made to a residential or business address and not to a public place.

The age verification policy (including challenge 25) shall clearly be advertised at each stage of the order and on all advertising. All forms of advertising and promotional literature detailing the delivery service (including internet sites and flyers/leaflets) will clearly state that alcohol should only be purchased for delivery to intended recipients (or persons who will accept delivery on behalf of the named recipient) who are aged over 18. Customers will be reminded that it is a criminal offence for a person under 18 to purchase or attempt to purchase alcohol and that it is also an offence to purchase alcohol on behalf of a person aged under 18.

At the time the order is placed a declaration will be required from the person placing the order that that person is aged over 18 years of age, and that the intended recipient is over 18 years of age. This process will be documented, (tick box before proceeding, record of verbal acknowledgement or similar). These records must be retained for no less than twelve months and produced on request to an officer of a Responsible Authority.

For deliveries where the alcohol is delivered by a third party, the alcohol is concealed in a secure sealed package, and the DPS has no direct supervision or control over the delivery (such as an independent courier or Royal Mail), there cannot be an age verification challenge on delivery, but the above conditions will be followed.

For deliveries made directly by the DPS or their employees, staff or agent or persons instructed by the DPS/PLH, the person accepting the delivery must be aged 18 years or over. Where the person accepting delivery appears to be under 25, a recognised photographic ID must be produced prior to delivery. No ID, no delivery.

Where the premises contracts a third party to deliver alcohol on their behalf and the person collecting the alcohol from the premises delivers it directly to the customer within a short timescale (such as Deliveroo, Just Eats), the premises will ensure that the third party:

- only employs delivery employees or agents aged 18 or over;
- is aware that alcohol is included in the delivery;
- that the delivery person actively engages with the person receiving delivery and operates a challenge 25 policy rather than just handing the delivery over;

Sussex Police, Neighbourhood Licensing Team

 that in the event that the recipient of the alcohol is challenged for ID and does not provide appropriate and valid ID, the delivery person will retain the alcohol and return it to the premises.

If the applicant is agreeable to the proposed conditions, Sussex Police can resolve this representation subject to these conditions being attached to the premises licence.
